

Elements of Reading:

Phonics – The relationship between letters and the individual sounds in spoken language.

Phonemic Awareness – Phonemes are the smallest units which make up spoken language. Phonemic awareness refers to a person's ability to manipulate phonemes in syllables and words.

Fluency – The ability to read with appropriate speed, accuracy, and proper expression.

Vocabulary – Students with a strong vocabulary have an easier time understanding what they are reading.

Comprehension – The ability of a person to understand what s/he is reading.



Head, Shoulders, **Knees and Toes** with Letter Sounds

Choose a word such as "cookie". Tap your head for /k/, shoulders for /oo/, knees for /k/, toes for /e/.


Phonics Relay

Take 6 sheets of paper and write one letter sound on each. Tape them to a wall. Take turns in which one player calls out a sound and the other runs to the wall and taps the paper with the corresponding letter or letters. Variations include hopping, skipping, or tiptoeing to the wall.



Sight word Tic-Tac-Toe

Draw a Tic-Tac-Toe grid with a sight word in each square. Players take turns reading the sight word in a square before placing an "x" or "o".



Words with Long Vowel Teams: sail, seal, boat, braid, deer, spray

Digraph Scavenger Hunt

Digraphs are single sounds that are made up of two letters. Prepare a set of index cards with digraphs:

ch, ph, sh, th, wh, qu, ow, ai, kn

Have your child pick a card. Sound out the digraph together. Give your child a bag and ask him to find something in your house that begins or ends with that sound. Continue by choosing additional digraphs.
